The end of the liturgical year falls on November 24th this year. The new liturgical year starts on the first Sunday of Advent, and the Gospel readings will mostly feature readings from Matthew's gospel. The new liturgical year is a busy time for the Worship Team. Gwen Chaplin will once again be putting together an Advent Wreath. It will be based on an earlier tradition using greens and herbs that are symbolic of the season. Gwen and Kevin will have the wreath set up

for the December 1st worship service.

On Sunday, November 17th, chairperson Margaret Antanaitis appealed to the congregation to please help out this year, as she is having back surgery. We will be decorating the Sanctuary on Saturday, December 7th at 9:00 AM. The Boy Scouts have once again agreed to cut trees for the church and the Home Zone and will have them at the church before the 7th. We will need help putting up the tree, hanging wreaths and greens, making the church look festive for the season. The Trustees are also asking decorators to help with getting the church cleaned up and looking its best for visitors who might be in church during this special time of year.

We will again be having a Nativity Scene display this year, continuing a tradition started by Susan Herdrich. If you have a Nativity Scene, please bring it with you to church sometime during December. All of the Nativity sets we receive will be displayed from Sunday, December 22^{nd} (the fourth Sunday of Advent) through Christmas Eve when those who loaned them can take them home again.

There will be two services on Christmas Eve. The early service will be at 7:00 PM and will be a family-oriented service led by Pastor Dirk. The later service be at 10:30 PM and will include Communion and will be led by Kevin Dow. Both services will include candlelighting.

AFTERNOON CIRCLE

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

Strategic Plan Goal V Update

Strategic Plan, Goal V, Serve the powerless and vulnerable as led by the Holy Spirit.

The Goal V focus this fall has been on immigration. We have searched out the local efforts being made to stand in solidarity with immigrants in our valley who are currently facing changes in their future. We have learned about the local grass roots organization, Yakima Immigrant Responses Network (YIRN) and are taking part in the efforts of this organization. We have learned about the Washington Immigrant Solidarity Network (WAISN), a statewide network who's focus is on building immigrant and refugee power in Washington State. We have attended a panel discussion where we heard from Alfredo Gonzales Benitez, attorney with Columbia Legal Services; Brenda Rodriguez, Eastern Washington Network Coordinator of WAISN; and Phil Neff, Project Coordinator University of Washington Center for Human Rights. And we had a meeting at SUMC where we learned from three guest speakers, Danielle Surkatty, YIRN; and two lawyers from the Northwest Justice Project; Michele Besso; and David Morales. This meeting was informative. We were able to ask many questions and get a better understanding of the immigrant issues and what is being done to address these issues in the Yakima Valley and the state. Some of our group attended an Accompaniment Training, to accompany people at risk of immigration detention when they go the court hose for civil matters or when they go to their USCIS, (US Citizen and Immigration Services) appointments. And some of our group took a webinar of Rapid Response training. Some of us also got to witness the immigration flights in and out of the Yakima Airport. There are many ways to support the immigrants in our valley. Would you like to learn more? Are you interested in being involved? We would love to have you. The Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath was originally a German and Scandinavian home devotional practice used to mark the four weeks of Advent. Although many symbols have been attributed to it since that time, it was originally intended as a way to mark the Advent season and the weeks

until Christmas. Families would light a candle for each past week and the current week at their dinner or evening time of prayer. The configuration of candles, whether in a line or a circle, did not matter. Neither did the color of the candles. What mattered was the marking of time and the increase of light each week in the face of increasing darkness as the winter solstice approached.

As Advent wreaths began to be used by congregations on Sundays in some places in Europe and America beginning in the late 19th century, adaptations were needed for the larger worship spaces. Candles needed to be larger and more specialized than the "daily candles" handmade or purchased for home use. They also needed to be more uniform in color to fit with other decor in the sanctuary. Purple (and more recently blue) has become the basic color of the candles to coordinate with color of the **paraments** used during this season.

As Advent wreaths changed from practical private use to the more symbolic context of public worship, it became important for the candles to have meaning rather than simply mark time and add light. Ceremonies were developed around the lighting of the candles each week.

In time there was an effort, largely spurred by church supply houses that sold the special candles and wreaths, to provide a particular meaning to each candle. The themes of Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace became popular, based on scriptures from the one-year lectionaries used at that time. However, the historic theme of Advent is more broad and deep than any one-word theme can capture.

So what are we to say, then, about the meaning of the Advent wreath today? We can still draw meaning from its original home use: to mark time while increasing light. Advent, the first season of the Christian year, is all about time. We await the day described in Revelation 21:23 when, "The city doesn't need the sun or the moon to shine on it, because God's glory is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb." At Christmas we celebrate that in Christ, "The true light that shines on all people was coming into the world" (John 1:9).
