

# Selah United Methodist Church Mark's Remarks

Many of us exchanged gifts with loved ones during the Christmas celebration. Our congregation provided many opportunities to provide gifts to express love and support for others whose life circumstances, health situation, or financial outlook made it difficult to be part of this gift-giving tradition. My thanks to all of you who gave generously so that others might receive. As part of our focus on gifts and gift-giving during the Advent season, some of us gathered on Sunday evenings to study and understand spiritual gifts and their importance for the church.

The group read and discussed scripture passages describing the Church as the Body of Christ, with each member an important part of the church's ministry and mission. Study participants had opportunity to fill out a survey to discern the Holy Spirit's work in and through their lives. The participants learned or were reminded that God calls and equips each of us for ministry, not just the people like me who are labeled "the minister." God provides each one with a unique gift or set of spiritual gifts to be used to strengthen the church.



So what spiritual gift or gifts are given to you? You may have a pretty good idea of what your gifts are: perhaps you have the ability to plan and work with people - to delegate responsibilities, track progress, evaluate effectiveness of procedures, attend to details. If so, you likely have the spiritual gift of "administration." Perhaps you are one to pitch in and serve behind the scenes—coming early or staying late to attend to the little things that seem of vital importance to you, but are ignored by most others. It's a good guess you are exhibiting the spiritual gift of "service." You might be a teacher or a leader or have exceptional empathy.

If you'd like to find out how the Holy Spirit may be calling and equipping you, take a few minutes to fill out our online spiritual gifts survey at <a href="www.umcdiscipleship.org/spiritual-gifts-inventory">www.umcdiscipleship.org/spiritual-gifts-inventory</a>. As you complete the questionnaire, ask God to help you come to know your gifts and to give you the courage and willingness to apply them. The spiritual gifts inventory is totally private and provided at no cost through SUMC's participation in Discipleship Ministries of the United Methodist Church. Once you've answered the questions you'll be given a summary of your spiritual gifts – and only you will know the outcome. But I hope you will share with me what you learn about yourself and what you learn through the experience. I

The stockings were a variety of sizes and colors that were filled with smaller stocking-sized fun things like pens and pencils, notepads, small toys and games, books, gloves, socks, and lots of holiday treats. SUMC Santas had a good time thinking of clever small things for children who live at Camp Hope. It would have been fun to watch these 4 to 17-year-olds sift through their own special stocking. We had our own Joshua Elf helping us pass out stockings to the excited children at Camp Hope.

Follow up to stocking stuffing day: the tables in the Simonson room were filled high with so many donations of stocking stuffers; small toys, games, crayons and pens, toothbrushes and paste, chips,

gloves and holiday candy that once the 18 or more stockings were filled to the brim, there was still a table full of holiday items left. We pondered where would be the best place to share our bounty. We took four full grocery bags to the YWCA where they currently have about 20 children staying in their domestic violence shelter.

Children and young people at Rod's House, Camp Hope, and the YWCA felt the Christmas love and generosity of the Selah United Methodist Church this holiday. This congregation, too, felt the love of giving during this special time of year. Thank you everyone!

#### **WORSHIP TEAM REPORT**

The Worship Team met at the Simonson Room on Wednesday, November 29<sup>th</sup> at Noon to discuss planning for Adent/Christmas services. Most of the things discussed have already come to pass.

We discussed having families in the church to light the candles and one member of the family being the Liturgist for that day. We discussed the "Greening" of the Sanctuary, which was held on December 2<sup>nd</sup>. We discussed having a collection of evergreen trees in the Chancel and one tree near the door on the Organ side of the Sanctuary for Angel Tree "ornaments". We also discussed having the artificial tree in the Narthex for collection of gifts for our various projects, like Rod's House and the Beauchamp Center. We discussed the Nativity Display and Open House which happened starting December 17<sup>th</sup>. We discussed plans for the "Longest Night" service for those who are grieving or who just need to slow down, meditate and relax to get away from the pressures of the season. We affirmed that we would celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Advent on December 24th, even though it is also Christmas Eve. That would make four worship services on the 24th: 10:30 morning worship, 4:00 service focused specifically on families with children, a 7:00 service with candlelight, carols and communion, and an 11:00 service also with candlelight, carols and communion for those who appreciate the symbolism of celebrating near midnight, close to the symbolic birth of the Christ child. December 31st will be "Flannel Sunday". It will be held in the Fellowship Hall. A similar activity was planned for last year, but heaving of the sidewalk outside the Fellowship Hall doors prevented us from opening the doors. Dress informally (flannel shirts or jammies) and come prepared for a fun time. (There may even be food involved). January 7<sup>th</sup> we will be remembering the **Baptism of Jesus**. The next team meeting will be on January 17<sup>th</sup> at Noon in the Worship Arts Room. Everyone is invited to join us as we review the season.

Weather permitting Ladies Circle meeting will be January  $4^{th}$  at 1:00 PM in the Simonson Room. All ladies are invited to join us. Our hosts this month are Sandy Shelton & Dorothy Munroe. We hope you can come.

several different chili entries at once.




#### **BOOK BUNCH IS READING AND....BAKING**

## **Generous Giving**

Greetings church family. Last month we shared that gifts and pledges for the fund drive for our new HVAC system (which is installed and working) appeared to be sufficient that we would not need to borrow any money. Well, not only is that true, but we received enough gifts designated for the new HVAC system and to pay off our existing loan that by the time you read this article, our loan will have been paid off! We also have received enough to cover the cost of the first year of the annual maintenance contract for the new system and to start a Capital Reserve Fund with approximately \$6,310. All because you all stepped up to fill the need!

However, the need continues. If you intended to donate toward the HVAC system, but had not sent your gift yet, please consider donating to our Capital Reserve Fund. This will be an ongoing fund that we hope to maintain and grow with giving over and above your regular giving to the church budget. There are other projects already identified around the church building we could tackle - making the building more friendly to folks with disabilities by remodeling the restrooms to be accessible and adding handrails on the steps to the chancel, to name just a couple ideas. Other ideas and suggestions are welcome. The thought of having funds available when a need arises instead of having to fret about how to pay for it would be a wonderful way to proceed in the ministry of SUMC! You are such a giving group; God truly continues to bless this congregation of believers. Thank you very much!!

If you look at the numbers above and think more funds were available for the HVAC system than is reflected, we received some in December, which is not reflected and there were Memorial funds given for the system which are also not reflected in the totals above.
