### Mark's Remarks

We've come to the start of a new year together. So, happy new year... again. This time it's not the calendar year that begins January 1. It's not the liturgical year that begins with the season of Advent during the four Sundays before Christmas. It's not the program year that begins with the first Sunday of September and the traditional kick-off of Sunday School and Christian education. This time it's the appointment year which begins July 1, when United Methodist pastors begin a new year serving their congregations.

I'm pleased to share the news you likely already know: I am appointed to serve a second year at Selah. One year ago, I arrived as your newly appointed pastor to preach and teach the word, administer the sacraments, and to provide oversight of the ministries of Selah United Methodist Church. I celebrate that we have been together in an official way for an entire year.

There is much to celebrate as we observe this moment. Our church continues to awaken from the COVID induced dormancy of our building. We've had numerous occasions for worship, study, fellowship and service within the walls of the church and outside the walls in the community. It's been a rich and blessed year. And that's all I have to say about that.

Now, "forgetting what lies behind, I press on toward what lies ahead." I want to focus on what I see as a primary focus for the coming year. I want to focus on making connections. This year I hope we can:

- 1. nurture stronger connections among our members
- 2. grow in ministry to the mission field that is our surrounding community
- 3. strengthen our connection with other United Methodist churches and ministries in our area.

This is my sense of where God calls us in the coming year. There are opportunities for growth in each of these areas. I just don't know what they look like yet. That's where you are needed; I am needed; and we are needed together for the sake of each and every person who is part of SUMC, as well as those who are disconnected from us, and those who are not yet connected with us or any church because they've never been invited.

We used to easily take connection for granted because there were district, conference area, and denominational structures to keep the United Methodist connection strong. Much of that connectional structure that was provided for us has been lost. It's not that we are disconnected. It's that the mechanisms that nurtured such connections are no longer in place.

I hope in this coming year to become more effective in inviting, welcoming and assimilating newcomers. I hope to be more intentional in reminding Selah that there is a place of worship



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and fellowship that is like no other in our community. And I hope to be of greater support to our neighboring United Methodist congregations in Yakima and Ellensburg, as well as learn how we might serve with our Sisters and Brothers in the White Swan area whose United Methodist Church ministries have gone dormant.

As I wrote earlier, I don't know exactly what any of this looks like yet. But I feel there is promise and potential as we journey toward stronger connections in our year of ministry.

Wesley prepared their hearty monthly meal; beef enchiladas, coleslaw, vegetables, brownies,

and milk. The resident numbers are up so Wesley is preparing larger amounts. The lines are



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longer, the plates are filled and the gratitude from hungry residents is as abundant as the food.

For a couple of months, we at Selah UMC have been picking up a few residents from Camp Hope and bringing them to one of the evening AA meetings at the church. A group of volunteers from one of the AA meetings has offered to organize an AA meeting at Camp Hope on Wednesdays doing away with the drive back and forth for the residents. We don't know these people who meet at our church every week, but their kindness and appreciation for our church over the years have opened up another venue for Camp Hope residents. We met the call for peanut butter and boxed Mac 'n' Cheese in June! In just three weeks, our church grocery basket filled with 17 jars of peanut butter, 45 boxes of pasta meals, plus some flour, sugar and canned pasta with meat meals. ### TO BE OR NOT TO BE A RECONCILING CHURCH

#### **Reconciling Ministries: Wholly Welcoming Persons with Disabilities**

When we think about Reconciling Ministries, we might not often consider how it applies to welcoming persons with disabilities. Personally, I hadn't given this aspect of church inclusion much thought until I came across an article in the *Christian Post* on the topic of welcoming persons with disabilities: <u>https://www.christianpost.com/news/most-churches-say-theyre-welcoming-to-all-but-few-accommodate-members-with-disabilities.html</u>. Reflecting on the article brought back memories of my son's experiences at our United Methodist Church (not a Reconciling Congregation) in Texas in the 1990s.

Anyway, this article features Joni Eareckson Tada (leader of a ministry, Joni and Friends, and a long-time quadriplegic) who provides church training on how to include people with disabilities. I was quite moved by her summation:

There is so much talk about mainstream and inclusion in churches. People with disabilities want to belong to a body of Christ.... We want to know that when we don't show up next Sunday for services that somebody is going to miss me. We want to be a friend.... We have to get rid of the mechanistic, abstract, dry, theoretical approach to people's needs and really practice Christianity with its sleeves rolled up.

Tada described what she meant by rolling up our sleeves. She said her life was changed when Christian friends gave her not only the Word but also their time and their love, e.g., "...a chance to go to a movie with them." "They just befriended me," she added. Ministering to youth – and their parents when disabilities are involved, brings up additional challenges. In another article <u>https://www.focusonthefamily.com/pro-life/special-needs/howto-practice-disability-inclusion-in-your-church/</u>, Natalie Maxwell, the mother of children with disabilities, shares that it is meaningful to be personal, "know our names." She emphasizes the need to ask questions, for e.g., "How can we love and serve you/your family?" A seemingly simple point she made was that we have to *willing*. Yet, I truly understand that it takes a lot to move the needle from willingness to sustained change.

My son, as a special needs child, had learning and emotional difficulties. He had trouble making friends and felt uncomfortable in group settings. Pre-school didn't go smoothly. On Sundays, though, I knew when I took him to his pre-school class at our UMC, he was going to feel comfortable; he was going to feel blanketed by the warm smiles of his teacher and co-teacher. Along with that, I didn't have a pit in my stomach thinking that after class, I might get pointers on how to improve my parenting skills. The kindergarten term was split between public kindergarten in the afternoons and our church before-school program. Public school didn't go smoothly either. On the other hand, his mornings at the church were a safe place, a happy place. What made the difference? Most assuredly, it was the church's loving program director and staff who practiced Christianity with their sleeves rolled all the way up to their



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shoulders. Later on, my son belonged to the scout troop supported by our church. The scout leaders, patient and kind members of our church, went the extra mile to assure a positive experience for my son. At age 15, my son was awarded the rank of Eagle Scout — an achievement that stemmed, in large part, from his experiences with wholly welcoming Christians.

However, not everyone in the church during my son's formative years was wholly welcoming. The church did not especially consider persons with physical or mental disabilities in any of its procedures or programs. There were instances when my son was overlooked to help with simple volunteer tasks. On occasion, there were whispers and glances our way in the fellowship hall. I asked myself then, and now, how Christians could better embrace individuals and families who have, or who care for persons with disabilities. How might we listen with discernment? How might we gain greater insights? I did *not* ask myself then about Reconciling Ministries, but I do now. I concur with Maxwell, "The thing that has made all the difference for our family hasn't been a well-organized ministry, but rather it's been individual people in the body of Christ who have taken the time to include and get to know our family over time."

That's also what Tada described about meeting her needs as an adult; that's what my child and I, as a parent, appreciated the most. I believe that a Reconciling Ministry potentially fosters even more love for, and inclusion of persons with disabilities. I hope that such love and inclusion is ultimately rooted not in a sense of obligation, but rather in a desire to simply be together—*wholly* welcoming.

#### **FINANCE REPORT**

If you are eagled eyed, you might notice that the figures are slightly different than last month. Previously, I had neglected to include in the income numbers \$1750 that is transferred from savings each month. Funds are transferred from savings to checking each month because of lump sum donation made with the request that it be used as needed to cover expenses. The finance team decided to transfer  $1/12^{th}$  of the amount each month. In addition to the monetary donations we receive to support the church, we also receive many material donations. In 2022 we received over items valued at over \$300 plus over 240 stamps and so far in 2023 we have received items valued at over \$1300 plus 120 stamps. The items include books for bible study, palms for Palm Sunday, banners, two computers, items for the kitchen, just to name a few. I suspect there are things donated for which we do not get a report. While these donations are not used to help pay our bills, they increase how much we have to pay those bills because we are not having to purchase these items. **Thank you to all who have donated items for use in the church.**
