Mark's Remarks

Every Thursday a group meets together for Pub Theology. Put simply, we have a theological conversation in a public setting. Our last gathering in May was the day after Aldersgate Day. You may or may not have heard of it, but if there's a red-letter day in our United Methodist heritage, it's Aldersgate Day—May 24, 1738. John Wesley was a washed up, discouraged Anglican priest who was ready to leave the ministry. Then something happened. He wrote about it in his journal:

In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death.

The reality of God's saving love and grace became an assurance for the first time in Wesley's life. He'd been an unenthused priest for 12 years until he experienced the spark of this heartwarming experience that ignited the Methodist movement. His ensuing ministry made Christian faith contagious throughout England and the American colonies. It all happened because one man was touched by God.

This tidbit of Methodist history inspired the question for our Post-Aldersgate-Day-Pub-Theology conversation. I asked attenders, "When have <u>you</u> most strongly felt the reality of God's love?" I was inspired by what followed. Participants shared many and varied stories of how God's love is experienced, each in our own way through our unique encounters with grace and love. Some stories were dramatic. Others were of quiet moments. Some were among gathered community. Others were alone in nature. All were profound because each story was a marker along the spiritual journeys of all who chose to share a moment when faith in God became something far more than an intellectual exercise.

I was struck by how varied are the pathways of our faith journeys. God makes many inroads to become real to us. God provides many paths that lead us closer to those divine encounters. God is waiting for us to wait or proceed, to risk or rest, to look or listen at just the



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right moment for an experience or encounter where God becomes real. We are changed by that moment of reality. We are drawn closer to God in a way that changes us.

That's what makes this Christian journey such a great adventure. If we are open to it (and sometimes, like John Wesley, when we are resisting it) God is waiting to touch us in life-changing ways that transform us and the world of which we are a part.

I know for many of us, the start of summer brings a change of activity, a change of pace, and/or a change of direction. Whether we do more or less; move faster or slower; turn to some new activity or return to a favorite place—may we sense God reaching out to touch each of our hearts in a way that reminds us of God's tangible grace and love. And may each of us be open to God-given opportunities and possibilities, when God's love and grace becomes evident. I look forward to hearing your stories. And perhaps having some of my own to share.

Selah Naches Food Bank

The move to the new stand-alone Selah Naches Food Bank in Selah is on the horizon. The food managers and volunteers are in the midst of planning and looking to August for the big move. Until then, it is business as usual; many area residents are depending on the food bank, their only

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
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the donation center needs and requests. Here is a list of items they label as "Always needed items": Can openers, of course! Now, who would have first thought of that as a necessity?

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Camp Hope

Camp Hope, too, received good news about expanding their mission. It was announced in April this year that Comprehensive Healthcare was awarded \$1 million in Washington state funding to construct a new facility at the Camp Hope site that will include an onsite behavioral health service center and more transitional housing. It will be designed to support people who are homeless and those who suffer from behavioral health and substance abuse. According to a

Comprehensive Health news release, the new facility will expand the low-barrier homeless encampment and will meet the safety, shelter, clothing and food needs of more than 180 people each day. Residents will have access to outpatient behavioral health services and immediate coordination and referral of their healthcare needs. This will include access to therapy for more permanent residents living at Camp Hope. This is certainly a blessing and a tribute to Director Mike Kay for his continual dedication to helping the behavioral health and homelessness of our region's most vulnerable population. Word is that the expansion will begin this coming fall.

In May, the Wesley UMC cooks planned, prepared and served with SUMC servers beef enchiladas, vegetables, coleslaw, brownies and milk. Almost 100 residents, feasted and satisfied their day's hunger. It is always a joy to see the grateful smiles as they finish their dinner with a favorite, this month brownies and milk. Thank you, Wesley UMC. We at SUMC are always happy to be a part of prepping and serving these delicious and nourishing meals.



WORSHIP TEAM REPORT

The Worship Team met Wednesday evening, May 10th at 6:00 PM in the Simonson Room. The Team spent a lot of time discussing Sunday School/Christian Education, as it interlinks with the worship program. It was noted that a lot of the people who have been active supporters of the Sunday School are now working with the Tech program during worship, leaving fewer people to carry the bulk of the load for the Sunday School. Several strategies were discussed including inviting some of the men in the congregation to volunteer some time on Sundays to lead a class. This problem of teacher shortage will become even more critical if/as our program continues to grow. If you are willing to volunteer a couple of Sundays, please talk to either Margaret Antanaitis or Cheryl Natland.

The Team discussed the scripture being used during worship services. Shortly after Pastor Mark arrived, we shifted from using the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) for the PowerPoint and Scripture readings from the Lectern and started using the Common English Bible (CEB) instead. While we weren't using PowerPoint last month we used the NRSV because it was available in the pews for people to follow along. We also want to purchase gift Bibles for young people in the church and want them to be a Bible that they can use and treasure for the rest of their lives. The PowerPoint will be back on May 28th with Scripture readings from the CEB, and the Team will be having further discussion on the translation we want to use in the future. If you have a favorite translation, talk to someone on the Worship Team and give your input.

We will no longer send worship bulletins out to everyone on our church email list. If you want to participate in the service on Zoom, the worship link is listed in each newsletter issue. 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TO BE OR NOT TO BE A RECONCILING CHURCH

Welcoming the Homeless

There, but for the grace of God go I. I've had that thought many times as I've driven past sections of S. Naches Ave., or past the Mission, or as I've talked to some of the folks at Camp Hope.

Sometimes homelessness is due to bad luck....losing a job during a down economy, or during covid. Or maybe it's because they're on a fixed income and have to choose between medicine or rent. Or, as is so often the case, perhaps it's because of an untreated mental illness such as depression, PTSD, schizophrenia etc. With depression, people often compound the problem by using alcohol and/or drugs to dull the senses and drown out that cesspool of negative thinking that's so often associated with depression: and that, in turn, is often accompanied by withdrawal and isolation. A recent article in the NY Times titled "Homeless in the City Where He Once Was Mayor" illustrates so well what the effects of mental illness can be. The former Mayor's name is Craig Coyner, the town is Bend, OR....."google" the article.

Sometime last year, I received an article which very much resonated with me. It's titled "Open the Eyes of My Heart" and it reads as follows:

As a community, especially our Christian community, open the eyes of our hearts, Lord. When we see someone sleeping on the street, open our eyes to see a young man or woman who was once running around a grade-school playground, full of life and promise and potential—open our eyes to see that potential is still there, and this person is still beloved by God now as they were then. Open our eyes to see the daughter, son, mother, father, brother, sister, grandma, grandpa. Not the "homeless person". When we see someone walking down the road who appears to be high—open the eyes of our to see a person who has likely faced a myriad of traumas that they have chosen to numb, with substances, the pain and the ache and the loneliness and the depression open our eyes to see the recovery potential and value that is still in this soul. Give us a vision of this person recovered and free, who is able to testify to the goodness of God and that there is life after addiction. When we pass a person on the street who is dirty, smelly and downcast—open the eyes of our heart to see a person who once was clean sheltered and alert—open our eyes to see someone that Jesus died for. When we see the homeless and the addicted, open the eyes of our heart to see what Jesus sees...a precious individual, worthy of the same grace that we ourselves seek and live under every day. They may be temporarily lost in the world due to any number of issues trauma, poor decisions, abuse, circumstance completely beyond their control—but they are not lost from God's love, nor should they be from our own. Open the eyes of our hearts, Lord. Open the eyes of our hearts.



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So, with the above in mind, when we have folks from Camp Hope join us on Sunday mornings, let us look beneath that veil of homelessness to see the individual and know that we have the ability to share God's love, to make them feel welcome, truly welcome
