Selah United Methodist Church Mark's Remarks

Most people place a high value on being in the third place, but it has nothing to do with finishing third in a contest. The "third place" is a term used to describe social surroundings—separate from our primary social environments of home ("first place") and the workplace ("second place").

The third place is where we go to hang out. Third places are neutral settings where we go to unwind in a public space, where we encounter familiar faces and make new acquaintances. Sociologists tell us these third places are important for civil discourse, democracy, civic engagement and establishing a sense of one's place in society. They serve as anchors of community life and create interactions that instill a sense of connection that can best be described as a communal spiritual experience. Third places can be found in bookstores, brewpubs, cafés, churches, clubs, coffee shops, community centers, concert venues, front stoops, gyms, market spaces, parks, public libraries and sports arenas.

This plethora of third places comes at a time when the search for spiritual meaning and spiritual experience is on the rise. People want to ask questions and be curious about matters of faith and who Jesus is. But past church experiences, bad church experiences, or lack of church experiences lead many to believe that the church is but one of many options for meaningful spiritual connection, experience, and growth. There is a commonly held assumption that people in church are fed answers about their faith without allowing room for self-discovery and self-expression. That stereotype leads others to overlook the church as a desirable third place.

"They will never step foot in a church, and so we have to go out and we have to be church with people where they are." That quote describes our current reality, but it is attributed to John Wesley more than 250 years ago. Wesley, an Anglican priest who founded the Methodist movement, loved Christ, loved the church, and loved the Christian tradition. But his love for people outside the church inspired him to adapt the church's traditional setting, music, liturgy, preaching and teaching to help people find meaningful connection to God and each other. His Methodist movement took Christ to people where they were, to eventually bring them into the faith and the faith community. Using this strategy, Wesley helped people find their third place in the church.

We Methodists need to recover and rediscover Wesley's passion for people outside of the church by taking the church to them. We have much to offer through congregational worship, Bible/book studies, shared meals, fellowship groups and mission teams. It's time to realign ourselves to be the most appropriate resource for those looking for spiritual meaning and connection. Selah United Methodist Church is a viable third place and becomes even more so



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by taking the love and grace of God and the ministry of SUMC into the first, second and third places of all those searching for connection with Christ and Christian community.

Selah Naches Food Bank

After 20 years of serving at the Selah Civic Center, the good word about the new Selah Naches Food Bank behind Grocery Outlet is spreading. Staff and volunteers are proud to be serving almost 600 families during their weekly eight hours of operation, Monday, Wednesday evening and Friday. The food donations from around the county and state are varied and plentiful. I learned this month that *anyone* can come and register at the Selah Naches Food Bank. You do not need to be a local resident or have a local address, but you do need to have some identification so that you can register and be entered into their computer system. Once registered, a person can come to the food bank and fill a basket once a month. I have asked about the once-a-month restriction, and the staff is quick to say the food they so willingly offer



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to participants is to supplement other food they acquire elsewhere. In the past, we have offered monthly suggestions which we will continue to do, but they have expanded their wish list to laundry soap, bar soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes, any toiletries and feminine hygiene products. Their mantra is if 100 people drop off just one item, the Gift of Giving adds up fast, "little by little, a little becomes a lot". This month, please give as you are able to the Food Bank grocery basket. The volunteers are always in need of baking items and condiments of any kind. Just in – we donated 60 lbs of food to the food bank in February.

Mix all the ingredients together and put in 9" X 13" pan and bake at 350° for one hour. While still hot melt a stick of butter on top.


Prayer Chain Warriors Needed

Let Us Worship Together



The season of Lent began with a Shrove Tuesday pancake dinner, Feb. 13, and an Ash Wednesday worship service, Feb. 14. As we continue to journey together through this Lenten Season in preparation of Easter, Pastor Mark shares his Sunday morning sermon series on *The Steps Along the Journey of Lent*. In addition, we will gather each Sunday evening at 6 p.m. to view and discuss an episode of *The Chosen* television series, which centers on the life and ministry of Jesus and the people he interacted with.

Our Holy Week observance will begin with **Palm Sunday**, March 24. The **Maundy Thursday** worship service,

March 28, 7 p.m., will include Communion and foot washing as we remember Jesus and the Last Supper. Those who wish to participate in the foot washing are reminded to wear easy to remove footwear to the service.

A **Good Friday** service of Tenebrae will be held March 29 at 7 p.m. Tenebrae, meaning shadows or darkness, incorporates numerous candles and a series of scripture readings from the Gospel of John recounting the events of Good Friday. After each reading, a candle is extinguished, and the service ends in darkness.

The **Easter** celebration on March 31 will begin with a Sunrise Service around the church fire pit at 7 a.m. followed by breakfast in the Fellowship Hall. The celebration of resurrection will continue with a worship service in the Sanctuary at 10:30 a.m.

Members of the congregation are encouraged to consider who they might invite to worship with them during Lent and Easter.

The next Worship Committee meeting is scheduled for March 20, 1 p.m., to finalize plans for our Easter celebration as well as Pentecost, May 19. The meeting is open to those interested in helping create a meaningful worship experience.

Selah United Women in Faith

March is Women's History Month, a time to celebrate the achievements our predecessors who boldly broke down barriers for future generations. Here are some timelines of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

- 1870: Clara Swain and Isabella Thoburn are sent to India as the first female English missionaries. One started a school and the other a medical facility.
- 1873: Bennett College for African American women is founded in the basement of Warrenville United Methodist Church in Greensboro NC.
- 1880: Methodist women mission leaders in the US help organize the Women's Home
 Missionary Society to help free black people in the south, teach Mexicans in New
 Mexico, minister to Morman women living under polygamy, and address the injustices
 experienced by Native Americans.
- 1885: Mary Fletcher Scranton founds the first school for girls in the history of Korea, which later becomes Ewha Girls' high School.
- 1888: the Women's Home Missionary Society, establishes an immigrant girl's home in New York City.
- 1899 early 20th century: The Women's Home Missionary Society begins creating National Mission Intuitions like Gum Moon Womens residence in San Francisco to serve urban immigrant women seeking work and shelter.

All this was done before women had the right to vote. Let us keep the vision our forbearers had to help those who suffer from the injustices of our society.
