Mark's Remarks

Our brains are wired to infer connections in life. That's how God made us and it's how we make sense of events going on in the world around us. We have a strong tendency to look for cause and effect.

Maybe we walk to work without our umbrella and it rained hard all afternoon. The forgotten umbrella and the rainy afternoon are coincidental and completely unrelated. Their only connection is that they happened on the same day. But then we start to wonder if it rained all afternoon *because* we forgot our umbrella. Each of the events happened around the same time and both have something to do with rain, so we easily connect them together. It's not logical, but our imaginations make a cause-and-effect connection.

I point this out because a number of members have approached me, asking about any connection between three simultaneous events which transpired recently:

1. Our congregation held a straw vote regarding the Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN).

2. News outlets told of UMC congregations voting to leave our denomination.

3. We took down the red flame on the front wall of the Sanctuary.

The timing of these three events is merely coincidental, like an unforeseen rainfall on a day when we have forgotten our umbrella. The occurrence of all these events at about the same time, however, has given opportunity to make all kinds of imaginative cause-and-effect assumptions to connect the dots and tie any two (or all three) events together. Even though it's neither accurate nor logical, such conjecture seems natural to me. About the time we held a straw vote to determine the impact of eighteen months of RMN conversation, the news media reported numerous stories of churches voting to disaffiliate from our United Methodist denomination. As we hear news of other churches leaving the denomination, our

United Methodist Church symbol of the flame has been removed from our sanctuary cross. Let me now deliver some news of my own to alleviate the unnecessary anxiety and anger resulting from repeated misinformation circulating among our members. First, we took a straw poll in March because it was time for our eighteen-month benchmark. It had nothing to do with denominational politics or leaving the UMC. It had everything to do with clarifying our call to share the love of Christ. Second, several United Methodist Churches across the United States are indeed leaving our denomination, but not to join the Reconciling Ministries



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Network. They are voting to leave because they are no longer willing to support the historic shared mission and ministry of the United Methodist Church. Our faithful members and leaders of SUMC have no interest or intent to leave the denomination of which we have always been a part. Third, our decision to take down the double red flames from the sanctuary was not to make room for the rainbow flame of the Reconciling Ministries logo. And the United Methodist flames were not removed because we are no longer aligned with the United Methodist Church. We'll continue to be United Methodist, and the faded fabric logo was retired from the front wall at the start of Lent because they were extremely dusty and covered in cobwebs. That's the truth of what really happened, and why.

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WORSHIP TEAM REPORT

The Worship Team for Selah UMC met at 6:00 in the evening on April 12th for their meeting to allow greater participation for those who work during the daytimes. The team reviewed worship services since their last meeting.

There were over 200 people who attended our Holy Week and Easter services: 55 for Palm Sunday, 30 for Maundy Thursday, 20 for Good Friday, 36 for SonRise Service and 68 for the 10:30 Easter service. Most of the people who came to the SonRise service stayed for the breakfast that followed. All of the services were very meaningful. Thanks to those who made all of them possible.

We noted that there were two persons in wheelchairs at the Easter service. It was decided that we need another short pew so there is room to accommodate family members of folks in wheelchairs. There is another short pew in the Chancel.

May 7 is Communion Sunday, and there will be a potluck and dessert auction following the service. Kevin and Elaine Dow will be gone on both May 14 and 21. The Worship Team is looking for someone to lead the singing on those two Sundays. May 14 is also Mother's Day, and because the potluck has been moved to the 7th, mothers will be able to leave after worship to spend time with their families that day.

May 20 will be the Installation Service for Bishop Cedrick Bridgeforth. The service will be livestreamed, and all members, both laity and clergy, are invited to watch as we formally celebrate the bishop's assignment to our area. Watch for information on how to sign in to the service online.

The calendar is really weird this year with Heritage Sunday, remembering John Wesley's "heart strangely warmed" experience, and Ascension Sunday both falling on May 21. Pentecost falls on May 28, and everyone is urged to wear red to church on that day. Trinity Sunday is always the Sunday after Pentecost, and this year it is also Peace with Justice Sunday. The next Worship Team meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 10th at 6:00 PM in the Simonson Room, and anyone who has ideas for making worship more meaningful, is urged to attend.

A Quilt of Valor[®] (QOV) is a quality, handmade quilt that is machine or hand quilted. It is awarded to a Service Member or Veteran who has been touched by war. The Quilt says unequivocally, "Thank you for your service and sacrifice in serving our nation."



(Continued from page 4) Who is eligible for a QOV?

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Any service member or living veteran who served in one of the following branches: Army, Marines, Navy, Air Force, and Coast Guard. Members of the activated National Guard and activated or active duty-special work (ADSW) reservists are included. The Army National Guard and Air Force National Guard are components of the Army and Air Force respectively. Merchant Marines activated from 1941 to 1945. Additionally, anyone who serves at the Dover Mortuary Facility is eligible.

•Served during declared war, conflicts, police actions, peacekeeping missions, and counter terrorism operations and/or times of peace.


•Service during, but not necessarily limited to, WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Panama, Beirut, Granada, Bosnia, the Cold War, Desert Storm, Desert Shield, Iraq, Afghanistan, anti-terrorism operations, and terrorism attacks against Armed Forces personnel is included.

•Only veterans with an Honorable or General Discharge status are eligible.

•QOVF does not award QOVs posthumously.

Methodism 101

Splitting, dividing, reforming...Methodism has long history of evolving

The Methodist Church was founded in America in 1784 because of change. When the Revolutionary War ended, all connections with England were severed including with the Church of England. The Methodist Movement, which formed under the umbrella of the Church of England, was formalized into the Methodist Episcopal Church in America.

In 1828, discontent over church governance resulted in a division leading to the Methodist Protestant Church.

In 1844, differing views over slavery had the southern churches breaking away to form the Methodist Episcopal Church South in response to growing opposition to ownership of slaves.

African Americans formed their own Methodist denominations in response to their treatment as second-class members in the Methodist Episcopal Church. The African Methodist Episcopal Church was formed in 1816. Another black Methodist community, the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church was formed in 1820.

In 1870, the Methodist Episcopal Church South formed a separate denomination for its black members, called the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church (now the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church.)

The United Brethren in Christ was established in 1800 and modeled on the Methodist organization. In 1803, Die Evangelische Germeinschaft (The Evangelical Association) was formed by German immigrants in Pennsylvania. These two denominations merged in 1946 to form the Evangelical United Brethren Church.

In 1939, the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Protestant Church merged to form the Methodist Church.

And in 1968, the Methodist Church united with the Evangelical United Brethren Church to become the United Methodist Church we know today.

The Methodist movement continues to evolve as we do our best to follow and live out the teachings of Jesus Christ. Who knows what the next evolution will hold?

Selah United Women in Faith

I haven't talked about our two National Mission Institutions in Washington that United Women in Faith support. This month I would like to give an overview of Tacoma Community House. Tacoma Community House has been providing services since 1910. They promote Social Justice and offer equity-advancing programs through Immigration, Education, Employment, Advocacy, and Housing. They annually provide 3500 program services to 3200 individuals from over

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110 countries. Tacoma Community House mission is to create opportunities for immigrants and other community members in the Puget Sound region through comprehensive services focused on self-sufficiency, inclusion, and advocacy.

Immigration services provided - Us Citizenship Classes, DACA Information, Family Based Immigration (A foreign citizen seeking to live permanently in the US must be sponsored by a immediate family member who is at least 21 yrs. old and is either a US citizen or a green card holder). They provide Education Services such as Adult Basic Education Classes, English Language Acquisition, GED.; Employment Services, weekly Friday workshops, and Job Posting. Victim Advocacy - offer free services and support to those who have been harmed by domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, and many other crimes.

The Reach Center: The Reach Center is a one stop center for young people between ages 16 - 24. they help with youth achieve educational goals, support with college applications and admissions, free educational workshops and help youth find a home and employment to become self-sufficient as well as offer a Violence Prevention Program. If you are ever in Tacoma, stop by Tacoma Community House and ask for a tour.

TO BE OR NOT TO BE A RECONCILING CHURCH

Regarding the recent straw vote, there were 55 ballots cast; the final tally being 44 yes votes, 6 no, and 5 undecided votes. The yes votes represent 80% of the total votes cast and, although significant, we feel that a higher percentage can be achieved thru continued dialogue, both written (think Newsletter) and verbal. So the effort to determine whether we're "to be or not to be" will continue thru Labor Day and, at that time, we'll take another straw vote.

For those who are UNDECIDED, there's still time to ask questions and, if you haven't already done so, to become part of the conversation. For those who voted NO, perhaps it's a matter of misunderstanding what's involved or simply not having all the facts; being a part of the conversation, asking questions, and keeping an open mind are all important before making a final decision. There is a notebook binder in the Simonson Room that has all previous newsletter articles having to do with our becoming a reconciling church; if you haven't read all of the articles, stop by and take a look, they may answer some of your questions.

On behalf of the Council, I would like to thank everyone who took the time cast a ballot and, in some cases, to add a comment. It's wonderful to see our church this engaged! Ron

From Kevin: The other day I had the opportunity to look over the straw ballots that were exploring to see if Selah UMC is ready to become a "Reconciling Congregation". I was impressed that of those who returned their ballots, eighty percent (80%) were in favor. I also noted that only fifty-five returned their ballots, still pretty good for a Sunday where between 65 and 70 were present in worship. There are a couple of concerns that stood out to me, and I offered to comment upon them for *The Messenger*.

One response commented that the church shouldn't declare that homosexuality isn't a sin. I wondered where that response came from. Nothing in the statement promoted by the Reconciling Ministry statement talks about sin. It lists several groups/categories of people who often feel they are not welcome in churches. The Reconciling Church statement tries to assure everyone that they are welcome in our church, and that we don't discriminate.

The Apostle Paul wrote to the church in Rome, "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23, KJV) That means we are <u>all</u> sinners. If we denied access to our church to those who sin, the church would be empty. We are charged with the responsibility of reaching out to everyone to let them know of the redeeming love of Jesus Christ. During Holy Week Pastor Mark read these words of Jesus: "I give you a new commandment. That you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." John 13:34, (NRSV). We aren't in the business of defining sin, and only accepting the sinless. We are about loving others as Christ loved us. Paul says: "But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us." Romans 5:8, NRSV)



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There are churches were the church board votes to decide if a person is acceptable for membership in that church. That is not <u>our</u> way! We invite <u>all</u> who would come to join us in the quest to be better than we currently are. In the next *Messenger* I will talk about my other concern. A hint: *A vote for becoming a Reconciling Congregation is* <u>NOT</u> *a vote to leave the*______United Methodist denomination.

FINANCE REPORT

The church council decided to have a finance update each month in the newsletter. We will show how our giving compares with our budget expenses each month and identify unexpected expenses that needed to paid with our giving. We try to make giving as easy as possible – during worship you can leave a check or cash in the giving box at the back of the sanctuary. You can arrange to have your bank mail a check to the church at designated intervals; funds can be withdrawn from your checking account once or twice a month automatically using Vanco, which is a company we have chosen to make automatic transfers from your account to the church account. If you wish to give using your credit card, you can go to the church web site at selahumc.org and click on the "Give" button at the top of the

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page and follow instructions on that page. Credit card payments from the web page are also processed by Vanco.
