FAITH - HOPE - LOVE IN ACTION Reminder that this coming Sunday will be our last for collecting Socks and underwear for Voices for Children. (clothing closet for foster children)

I would like to bring your attention to a serious subject matter that seems to heighten in the fall and that is teen suicide. A recent article in the United Methodist Woman Response magazine stated that suicide is the leading cause of death for young people between the ages of 10 and 24. Approximately 4600 lives are lost each year and another 157,000 young people are injured during suicide attempts each year. LGBTQ youths are three to six times more likely to attempt suicide than other youth. The National United Methodist Women awarded two \$50,00 grants to two organizations - The Trevor Project and the Tyler Clementi Foundation that offer services to prevent teen suicide. These programs offer safe, accepting and inclusive environments for youth especially the LGBTQ. They also offer programs to end online and offline bullying in schools, workplaces and faith communities. Let's look for ways to support our local schools and outreach programs toward preventing teen suicide.



All Saints Day: A holy day John Wesley loved



November 1 is All Saints Day, a sometimes-overlooked holy day in United Methodist congregations. It is not nearly as well known as the day before, All Hallows' (Saints') Eve, better known as Halloween, but is far more important in the life of the church. John Wesley, enjoyed and celebrated All Saints Day. In a journal entry from November 1, 1767, Wesley calls it "a festival I truly love." On the same day in 1788, he writes, "I always find this a comfortable day." The following year he calls it "a day that I peculiarly love."

Wesley cautioned against holding saints in too high regard; however, he also advised against disregarding the saints altogether. In an All Saints Day journal entry dated Monday, November 1, 1756, Wesley writes, "How superstitious are they who scruple giving God solemn thanks for the lives and deaths of his saints!" It might help to know that the word scruple means, "to be unwilling to do something because you think it is improper, morally wrong, etc.

All Saints Day is an opportunity to give thanks for all those who have gone before us in the faith. It is a time to celebrate our history, what United Methodists call the tradition of the church. From the early days of Christianity, there is a sense that the Church consists of not only all living believers, but also all who have gone before us. For example, in Hebrews 12 the author encourages Christians to remember that a "great cloud of witnesses" surrounds us encouraging us, cheering us on.

On All Saints Day we remember all those—famous or obscure—who are part of the "communion of saints" we confess whenever we recite <u>The Apostles' Creed</u>. We tell the stories of the saints "to glory gone.
