Selah United Methodist Church Mark's Remarks

The past few weeks have been filled with opportunities to visit members who are home-bound, hospitalized, recovering in a rehab center, residing in an assisted living facility, or approaching the end of life in a hospice setting. It doesn't require a seminary degree or specialized training for any of us to be present with someone in need of comfort and consolation. They may be dealing with a recent loss, a disappointing outcome, an unanticipated diagnosis, an uncertain future, or feelings of loneliness and isolation. Such times often provide a sacred opportunity of showing that we care—and that we care enough to stand with them, sit with them, walk with them or wait with them.

As Christians, most of us feel unqualified since we usually bring no medical skill, no spiritual gift of healing, no miraculous power and no wondrous solutions. The only things we bring with us are the gifts of prayer and presence. These often seem to be less than enough, but it's what we have to bring and scripture often reminds us that no one facing difficult circumstances should have to face them alone. Many times a shared prayer and time simply being with them is an offering greater than anything else we have to give.

Although I have never mastered the ability to knit, I am so grateful that our church has developed a ministry that allows any of us to give someone a prayer shawl as a tangible reminder of belonging to our church family. I understand the prayerful practice of knitting that goes into creating these shawls. Often they have been prayed over by the Sunday congregation, a ministry team or a fellowship group before delivery.

It is inspiriting to see the impact these prayer shawls have on those who receive them. They are an example of the church at its best because, from the first stitch to the final delivery of a prayer shawl, the power of God's grace is at work among us, in us and through us. If you know of a sister or brother who would benefit from the gifts of prayer and presence, let me or another of our leaders know and we'll provide assistance to deliver the gift of faith, hope and love expressed through our prayer shawl ministry. It gives you another reason to be there with them and bring prayer to them. I invite you to be faithful in offering your gifts of presence and prayer. And knitting. Before closing, I wanted to share this note written to accompany the delivery of a prayer shawl:

This Prayer Shawl was knit just for you in an alternating three stitch pattern. Three is an important biblical number. It points toward wholeness, completeness, and Divine perfection, symbolized by the Trinity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Our existence has three stages: life, death and resurrection. We are physical, mental and spiritual beings. Time has past, present and future. Nature is made up of earth, sea and sky. Matter exists as solid, liquid and gas. Beyond all of this, your shawl was prepared in prayer for you...hands, heart and the Holy Spirit lifted you to the Lord from the very first stitch, through every stitch, to the very last stitch. May you continue to feel God's presence in this expression of faith, hope and love offering comfort to you in body, mind and spirit.

Selah Food Bank

Rod's House and Camp Hope

These two homeless shelters are both working to prepare for winter and the cold days and nights that will follow.

Rod's House is again planning an "extreme winter weather shelter" that operates from November to March. Each winter, a local motel partners with Rod's House to give rooms for the night to 20 young people, ages 18-24, with 2 or 3 to a room. This year the Day's Inn on North First Street in Yakima will provide a safe, warm room with a bed, shower, microwave and refrigerator. This has been a blessing to many homeless young people over the past few years. Meal partners provide warm meals in the evening that the young people can take to their room at the severe winter shelter. Rod's House also asks for meals at the yellow Rod's House on Naches which continues to be open during winter weekdays for food and showers until 6:00 p.m. Camp Hope works hard to provide warm shelter and food for the more than 100 residents. Wesley UMC and Selah UMC provide a warm meal to gathering residents each month. The dinner tent is cold, but the residents are bundled in warm coats and blankets as they line up uncomplaining for the hot dinner served to them by UMC members who are equally as grateful for their smiles and "God bless you" words of appreciation. Donations of blankets and cold-weather sleeping bags are always welcomed.

WORSHIP TEAM REPORT

The Worship Team met on Wednesday, October 18th in the Worship Arts Room for its regular meeting. The group shared some of the reactions from visitors who toured the building during the Harvest Fest. Reactions were very positive. Some folks had never been in the building before and were impressed. The tent in the "Kid's Club" (Sunday School) room got good reviews. The group talked about how we can help our young worshippers feel at home in the church. It was suggested that we treat the youngsters like they were part of your family, and engage them in conversation about themselves to get to know them. We also suggested that we can give them tasks to do, like lighting the candles. It is important to have adults who can be with the children at Kid's Club. If you are willing to help out, talk to Cheryl Natland. The church received eight new members in October. That makes a total of 17 new members in 2023 (so far)! We welcome all of them and encourage everyone to get to know them. The church will be celebrating All-Saints Sunday on November 5th. There will be the reading of the names of those members who have died in the past year and their relatives will be invited to light candles as a part of the worship service. We will be celebrating Holy Communion on that day, and others will have the opportunity to light candles in memory of loved ones as they come forward for Communion. If you know of a member of the church who has died in the past year, please tell Pastor Mark, or Kevin or Elaine Dow. The team has a list of names, but we don't want to accidentally overlook someone. We would rather have a name twice than miss someone.


BOOK BUNCH: GOOD FOR THE SOUL


