
Mission Outreach



It probably comes as no surprise, but the WSDOT notified us that the volunteer coffee service at Indian John Rest Area will be "closed indefinitely" until 2021 because of the pandemic. It has been closed for months. Our reserved weekend was October 2-5. Each year, we call in on Columbus Day to reserve a weekend for the following year. This year's reservation call-in has also been cancelled until next year.

- The ministry of delivering meals to Camp Hope continues through the efforts of Wesley UMC with a little help from Selah UMC. In August, a nice summer meal included hot dogs grilled on site by a couple from Wesley, baked beans, coleslaw, potato chips, cake, milk and lemonade. We contributed milk, potato chips and several cakes. Camp Hope continues to stay COVID free and viable each month. There has been some progress in receiving their non-profit status. Please

pray that they remain safe and free of virus...and open. The monthly dinner always includes enough for the Noah's Ark residents in Wapato. You may have read that Noah's Ark was closed for security reasons in mid-August. Friends of the facility are working hard to make repairs and meet safety requirements so that it can be reopened soon. We all hope that in September the monthly meal will again include food for Noah's Ark.



- The Selah Food Bank with the help of the community and NW Harvest continues to provide food for Selah Area residents on Monday and Friday morning. Our Selah Food Bank is working hard to stay on top of the increased needs of the community; it is good to know that they are being supported in part with aid from the State. An article in the August 11 Yakima Herald-Republic read in part:, "the CEO of NW Harvest recently said that over a seven-month span during this crisis, we'll spend more on purchasing food that we have for the previous four years combined". Washington State has stepped up it's effort to warehouse food for any upcoming disaster. The story continued:

"Since the coronavirus crisis first rocked Washington in March, nonprofits and state agencies working in food assistance have been forced to draw a completely new road map for getting food to people who need it. The warehouse in Fife is part of a new model . . . The Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA) began preparing to buy and stockpile tons of food to ward off a shortage in the months ahead. The new stockpile is driven by two major factors: a nearly doubling in demand for food assistance across the state and a national food supply chain that is bogged down amid an overwhelming surge in demand . . . We've been in this very desperate situation starting toward the end of March. We went into panic mode . . .and jumped in with both feet and started active procurement. " To illustrate, they have purchased or received

194,000 jars of peanut butter - enough to make nearly 3 million sandwiches, pasta boxes stacked to the ceiling and large stacks of Tree Top products. Our Selah Food Bank is doing their part by monitoring our community needs and actively procuring those needs each week.

- Rod's House homeless teens and young adults are no longer in residence at the Unitarian Church. They are being housed temporarily in local motels until September 14th. The local Rod's House, which is closed, and a new facility in Sunnyside are being prepared to open again according to safe guidelines for the young residents where they will continue to receive food, some shelter, counseling, clothing and toiletries.

Reimagining Life

Yakima County has just been approved to move further into modified Phase 1 of opening allowing churches to offer inside worship services again at limited capacity with strict guidelines. When we are able to gather together for in-person worship service, life will be different. Worshippers will still

be required to wear masks, use hand sanitizer, refrain from physical contact with others (like handshakes and hugs), and a lot of the things that make worshipping together meaningful are things that are hazardous (like singing, visiting after worship and sharing meals). The task force continues to work on developing the guidelines that will allow us to worship in person. The guidelines will need to be approved by our district superintendent. We are fortunate to have been able to worship together using Zoom with personal interaction during and after the service. Many of the video worship services offered locally have not had the personal interaction that we have enjoyed.

Job Well Done



From our District Superintendent, Joanne Coleman Campbell

Greetings Pastors, Clergy, and Laity

In a time of crisis, it is always profitable to read the prophets. They suddenly seem more relevant and, well, prophetic. They warn the "faithful" – the Israelites – particularly those in political and economic power, but also the equivalent of the middle and upper middleclass folk. They point out the inequities that are increasing in the land. They cry foul on the people who take land from the poor, because "they can." They are disgusted by those who give full and showy outward due to the Sabbath but plot how to increase their wealth and power as soon as the Sabbath is over. A particularly heinous crime, in the eyes of the prophets, was to take the land from the poor, which not only forced them into indentured servitude but interfered with their ability to worship God. For the ancient Israelites, their connection to God was deeply tied to their literal connection to the promised land. To stand barefoot in the dirt they felt God gave them, the holy ground, no longer slave but a free people, was essential to remembering who they were and whose they were. The "middle class" were not let off the hook, for while they may not have actually taken the land, the prophets decried that they did not use their position in society to challenge those who did. They profited by the status quo, and claimed they were helpless to change anything.

And so, we are told, God brought the Babylonians down upon the Israelites, and destroyed their temple, and took into captivity all the elite and middle-class Israelites. Removed them from their land, took away their power and wealth, and brought them into the very land of the enemy. Profane ground, leaving them (in their minds) unable to connect with God, to worship in any meaningful way. But God would not let them alone. Read Jeremiah 29:1-14. Read Micah 6:6-8. Read Isaiah 43:18-19. God tells them that God can be found anywhere, for those who seek in earnest. That what is required for worship is to do justice, love kindness, walk humbly with God. And that we should not consider the things of old, or dwell on former or traditional ways, but to look carefully, for God is doing a new thing.

Just like the ancient Israelites, we are in a prolonged time of crisis. Everything we consider normal, traditional, right, is being called into question or thrown out the window. Our world – and our church – is turned upside down. No longer do we have the luxury to "think about" changing the way we do church, the way we live out our lives as followers of Christ. We are being forced into knowing God in new ways, understanding worship and community and our baptismal vows in a new and harsh light. The harder we cling to the old ways, the longer we will draw out the crisis of our time. Pray that our young will have

the vision and creativity to pull us through this time. Pray that the old – which is most of us in the church – will have the courage to lend our wisdom but not our fear, to follow bravely, or at the very minimum, to get out of the way. Pray that justice, kindness, and humbleness be our hallmark throughout the land. Pray without ceasing – and allow such prayer to transform us all.
